CPR News provides comprehensive, fact-based news and information from Colorado's largest nonprofit newsroom. Thanks to our public media model and supporters like you, the news we provide – including on-air, digital stories, podcasts, newsletters and social media – is never put behind a paywall. Last summer, CPR was the first U.S. media organization to obtain a Journalism Trust Initiative certification based on the transparency, independence and professionalism of our editorial practices.

This year, CPR News led the way with coverage of the trials in the death of Elijah McClain. From jury selection – when reporter Allison Sherry broke a story that the Aurora Police Department had sent undercover officers to the jury selection – through live special coverage when each of the three trials announced verdicts, CPR News stayed on the story with focus, dedication and compassion.

In May, at a congressional hearing on NPR brought on by the politicization of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, Colorado Representative Diana DeGette testified to the importance of public media and the value CPR brings to the public. She pointed out that CPR is the only Colorado news organization with a reporter based in Washington, D.C., and that this reporter's role is to report on the entire Colorado delegation on behalf of all Coloradans.

CPR also prioritizes offering solutions in its journalism, as opposed to simply reporting on issues and problems. This year, "news you can use" stories covering EV discounts and rebates, new laws, free college programs and whether or not the air is safe to breathe near I-70 were especially popular with readers.

Beyond vital coverage of justice, politics and breaking news, CPR News also sought to showcase lighter topics to help counteract feelings of news fatigue. In January, we launched a new on-air and digital feature, the CO Arts Spotlight, to provide a weekly roundup of some of the arts events happening around the state.

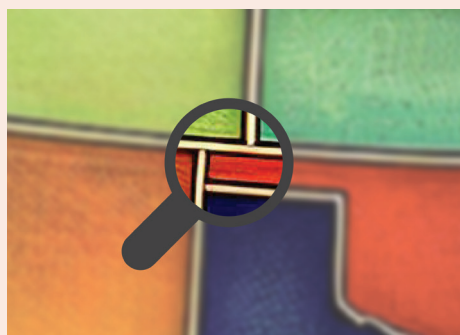

COLORADO POSTCARDS

In the fall, Dr. Kim Walter, the digital teacher librarian at Shelton Elementary School in Golden, reached out to tell us she wanted to use Colorado Postcards with her students. She contacted Colorado Postcards creators Gillian Coldsnow and Jon Pinnow, who met with the students virtually to kick off the project. Then, the kids got to work researching topics, writing scripts, creating artwork, editing and eventually recording their own postcards.

From these recordings and drawings, Gillian and Jon chose two topics to turn into official Colorado Postcards. They then visited the school in person with recording equipment to record about two dozen third graders reading the scripts.

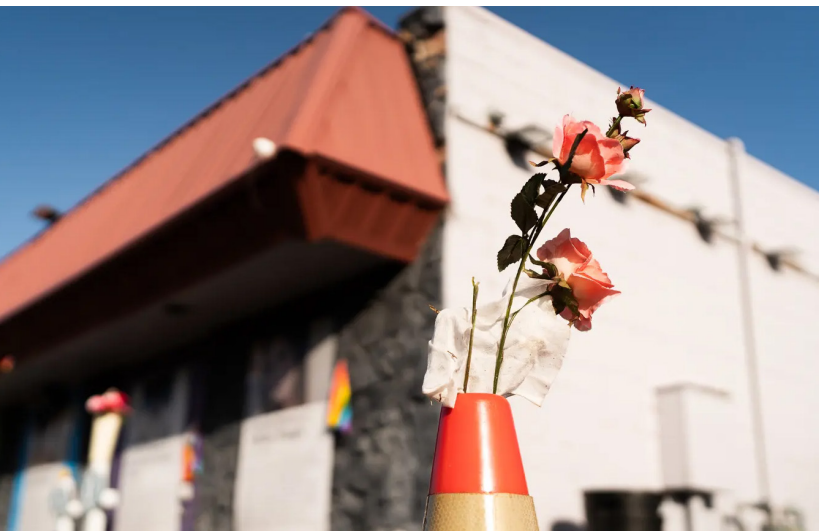


KRCC RECEIVES NATIONAL RECOGNITION

In November 2022, Colorado Springs was rocked by the mass shooting at LGBTQ nightclub Club Q. In honor of the first anniversary of the tragedy, KRCC reporter Abigail Beckman produced four interviews with survivors, which were compiled as a documentary and published on CPR's podcast Colorado In Depth. Taken together, the stories show how each person survives and recovers from tragedy in their own way. The documentary won a prestigious National Edward R. Murrow Award for audio reporting as well as an award from the NLGJA: The Association of LGBTQ+ Journalists.

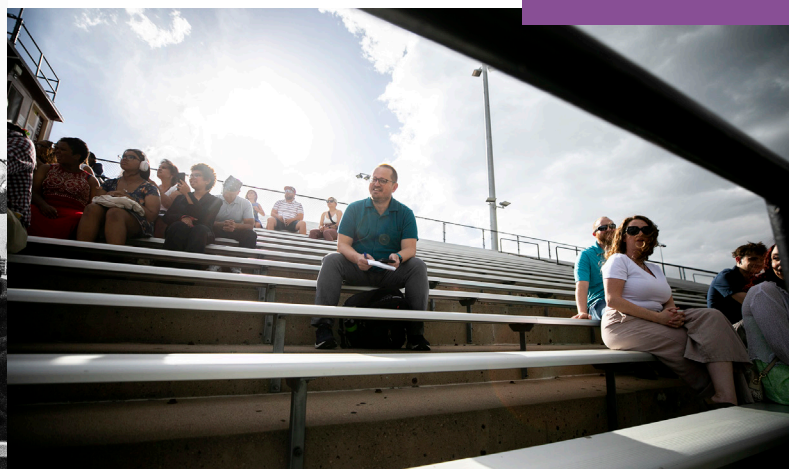


HAPPENINGS AT THE SOUTHERN COLORADO PUBLIC MEDIA CENTER

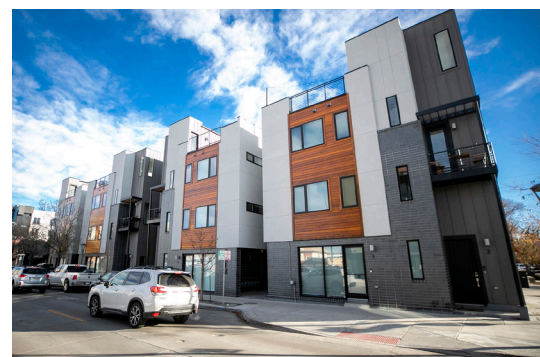

Our new home will be a hub for community conversations and interactions, a place where people will come together for expert panels, debates, podcast tapings, musical performances and so much more.

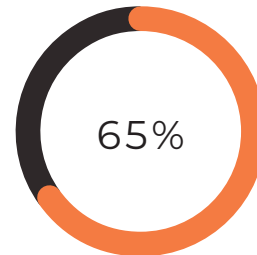
“Neither snow nor rain nor heat nor gloom of night...”

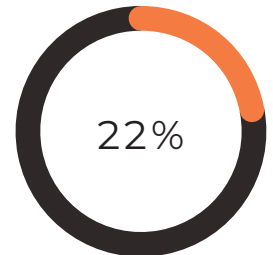

Operating Revenue

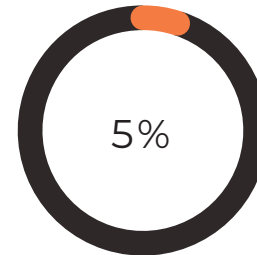
